

-During this half term our enquiry is:

Why is the Sky Blue?

This half term we will be exploring the weather and winter in particular. We will be thinking about and exploring this fascinating topic and investigating questions including- What do we know about the weather? Where does snow and rain come from? Is the sky always blue? This is a super topic for all of our children that enables them to be outdoors noticing changes to the weather using all their senses.

Subject	Activities / areas to be covered in school	Possible learning at home
Personal, Social and Emotional Development.	<p>I will be learning to....</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talk about how we can look after ourselves, animals and the environment especially during very cold weather • Discuss character feelings, discuss how feelings change- Using the story One Snowy Night by Nick Butterworth • Getting along & sharing with our peers and resolving conflicts with other children e.g. finding a compromise- revisiting the school rules and why they are important • Getting dressed and undressed for PE 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Encourage your child to be as independent as they can. Spend some time on a weekend allowing them to get themselves ready – I know this can be a rush on a school morning! The children will now be getting themselves dressed and undressed for PE sessions and therefore any practise at home will help them. • Chat together about the weather and what you notice out of your window. • Ask your child the question – What makes a good friend? What do we need to do to be a good friend?
Physical Development	<p>I will be learning to...</p> <p>Weekly handwriting, PE- using the large apparatus, dance using Chinese New Year dragon – moving in a variety of ways</p> <p>Fine Motor Skills: Jungle Journey intervention, handwriting practice</p> <p>Keeping healthy / looking after our bodies and wrapping up warm for winter. Thinking about why we wear what we wear.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Keep practising the graphemes at home and using the mantras as you write them. • Play throwing and catching with your child. This is a great activity to develop hand eye coordination and helps develop muscles in hands. • Discuss germs and how they spread. Practise coughing into the arm of their sleeves or into a tissue and making sure it goes in the bin. • Look at ways of keeping healthy during the winter months.

Write words and sentences to retell stories and to label.</p> <p>Start to write simple sentences</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Practise the phonemes regularly along with the tricky words and high frequency words. Practise the words/sentences on the phoneme card homework. • Share your child's reading book as often as possible. This will help your child's fluency when reading which inevitably helps with their understanding of the text. This reading book will be the same one the children are reading during Little Wandle reading sessions. (Please ensure this comes to school everyday in your child's reading folder and with their reading diary. Talk to your child about the seasonal changes. Are there any trees still with leaves- why? What is the weather like today? How do we know it's going to rain? Can you see your breath when you breathe? Why? etc You might like to watch the weather forecast together. • Discuss the New Year 2023. Share your New Year Resolutions with each other • Get creative and make a wintry picture/sculpture using different white materials? • If it is going to be really cold, make some ice mobiles together by filling jam jar lids with water and placing petals in the water. Lay down some string and let them freeze overnight. Hang them up and see how long they take to melt. • Watch to see which birds frequent your garden- discover what birds like to eat
<p>Expressive Arts and Design</p>	<p>I will be learning to...</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • explore sounds and move to music in weekly music sessions • play a variety of instruments • painting wintry pictures • sing familiar songs • looking at how white paint changes colours • explore 2D and 3D art • create snowflakes • small world play • Explore artists painting about winter • Transient art with loose parts 	<p>Continue to sing nursery rhymes and other songs that the children might know.
