Each year we cover an online issue or theme that speaks to the things young people are seeing and experiencing online. For 2024 the focus was how we can change our habits online.

Younger children looked at how sometimes we see changes online like pop ups and messages, they discussed what to do in each scenario and how it is important to speak to a trusted adult if something suddenly changes and they don't know what to do.

### Year 5 and the PCC Challenge

We were introduced to the challenge in September, when we had a visit from Emily who works with the Durham Agency Against Crime. She set the whole of Year 5 a "Durham Police and Crime Commissioners Challenge" (PCC Challenge).

It was created for young people in County Durham and Darlington to give a little extra to help make their local community safer and stronger, as well as more resilient to crime and antisocial behaviour.

The children were given a booklet to work through at home (as well as a fancy UV pen!). Their challenges included finding ways to make their own home safer against crime, helping out in the community and carrying out acts of kindness.

### Taking Responsibility

One of our assembly themes this half term focuses on how we can take responsibility. We are looking at how we can take responsibility for different aspects of school life and our student leaders play a very important role is this. Our Play Leaders, Reader Leaders, School Council and Eco Ambassadors host assemblies to feed back about their work and the improvements they want to make to our school. Our Eco Ambassadors have shown us how we can recycle better and will be organising our annual Spring Clean litter pick.
